






Just a stone's throw from the Department, this hidden pub is a firm favourite with our academics. Running along one side of the pub is one of the remaining sections of the old city wall. Due to the illegal activities of many of its original patrons, the Turf sprang up in an area just outside the city wall in order to escape the jurisdiction of the governing bodies of the local colleges.

'The Turf' is also where future Australian Prime Minister Bob Hawke set a Guinness World Record for consuming a yard glass of ale in 11 seconds in 1954. Other public figures who have dined or drunk at the tavern include Richard Burton, Elizabeth Taylor, Tony Blair, CS Lewis, Stephen Hawking and Margaret Thatcher.

The famous Kings Arms is the oldest pub in Oxford, built in 1607 and still standing in its original position. A firm favourite for academics, this pub is claimed for having the highest IQ per square foot of anywhere in the world! Loved by Oxford scholars and tourists alike, renowned for fine cask ales, hearty homemade food and a resident ghost. Dine off a seasonal menu and enjoy your favourite tipple in this hearty pub- just a 10 minute walk from the Department.





BEST PIZZAS




There's no question here, the best pizza (loved by Italians and locals alike) is found at The White Rabbit.





The Ultimate Picture Palace, Jeune Street - The UPP is Oxford's only independent cinema and one of the oldest cinemas in the UK. UPP shows a mix of independent, international, and classic films all in their cosy single-screen auditorium. Find it just off the Cowley Road in East Oxford.

Phoenix Picturehouse, Walton Street – For more commercial cinema, head to the Phoenix Picturehouse, where you can see the latest releases with a drink in-hand from the upstairs bar.

Life Drawing Classes – If you want to express an artistic flare or walk a little on the risky side- Oxford hosts many life drawing classes that require no sign-up. Find @oxfordlifedrawing on Facebook or Instagram for the locations of their weekly Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday classes (£7 per person as of July 2023). The class will supply you with all materials including pencil, easel and paper

Jericho Tavern- Find great music and comedy at this local pub. This hotspot for new artists can thank its connection to various bands who took their baby steps in the late 80s/early 90s. Radiohead performed here under the name of 'On a Friday' and Supergrass were signed shortly after gracing the Jericho Tavern stage.

The Holywell Music Room, Holywell Street – for those with a taste for the finer arts, the Holywell Music Room is the city of Oxford's chamber music hall and is part of Wadham College. It is said to be the oldest purpose-built music room in Europe, and hence Britain's first concert hall.

Weston Library exhibitions, Broad Street - The Weston Library is the home of the Bodleian Libraries' special collections. It is a working library and research centre, as well as a public event and exhibition space. The library regularly hosts special exhibitions on the ground floor of the building.





DIRECTIONS!

Christ Church College to Iffley Village (2 hours there and back)



This walk along the river path will take you from the city centre to the beautiful Iffley Village.

Stop at the Isis Farmhouse pub to recharge.

Jericho to Port Meadow and Godstow Abbey (3 hour round trip)

If time is on your side, take a walk through Jericho up to Port Meadow. Walk as far as the derelict Godstow Abbey and say hello to the wild horses on your way to the Perch pub.

Please be aware this route floods regularly in January - March.
